Introduction

Mullaghmore Sailing Club remains deeply committed to environmental sustainability and proudly supports the Sailors for the Sea Clean Regattas Programme. Each year, our Camile Mullaghmore Regatta is designed around the five interconnected Sustainability Themes: Elimination of Single-Use Items, Environmental Stewardship, Green Boating, Community Involvement, and Responsible Waste Management.

Following our Platinum Level achievements in 2022, 2023, and 2024, our Green Team once again set the bar high for 2025. Using the latest Sailors for the Sea Toolkit, the team worked diligently to meet all 20 Best Practices.

This report highlights how Mullaghmore Sailing Club successfully delivered a Platinum-Level Clean Regatta during the Camile Mullaghmore Regatta 2025.

Eliminate Single-Use Water Bottles and Provide Water Refill Stations

Mullaghmore Sailing Club continues its long-standing ban on single-use plastics, introduced eight years ago. We are saddened to learn that Plastic beverage bottles are still consistently in the top five most collected items at beach clean-ups around the world, according to the International Coastal Cleanup. Our commitment ensures fewer plastic bottles reach our waters or shorelines, reinforcing our pledge to protect the marine environment.

Members and visitors are encouraged to use reusable bottles and containers, supported by easily accessible drinking water taps throughout the clubhouse and at the slipway.

Reusable containers and bottles have featured as Regatta prizes in recent years, and it is rewarding to see them in active use season after season.

Furthermore, the club has invested in glassware that is reused year after year for functions, including the annual Camile Regatta Dinner. We have wine glasses, tumblers and jugs that are used for these occasions.





Eliminate Plastic Straws

Plastic straws and stirrers remain among the top littered beach items globally. Our club continues its strict prohibition of single-use plastic straws. Instead, glass jugs and reusable glassware are used at all social events, and our kitchen is fully equipped with ceramic mugs, glassware, and steel utensils — eliminating disposable alternatives entirely.





Serve Food with Plastic-Free Dinnerware

As outlined in our 2024 report, Mullaghmore Sailing Club has fully transitioned to reusable dinnerware, and our 2025 Camile Regatta Dinner continues to embody that commitment. It is encouraging to see returns on our initial investment year after year, which has reduced our overall spend and significantly reduced single use plastics in our club.

Tables were beautifully set with washable tablecloths, steel cutlery, ceramic plates, and glass drinkware. Water was served from glass jugs, and decorations included reusable glass candle holders. All food provided for the Camile Mullaghmore Regatta 2025 was stored and served from reusable containers, using steel serving utensils and wooden/ceramic washable dishes.







Skip Bags or Go Reusable

Since Ireland's plastic bag levy in 2002, public behaviour has changed dramatically. Our members continue to model this shift, using reusable shopping bags, washable cloths, and tea towels instead of paper products.

At the 2025 Regatta, biodegradable bags made from plant starch were used when necessary for food waste only. This year we eliminated the use of plastic/ biodegradable bags for collecting general waste and recycling. Instead, we provided bins which were washed after our Regatta and are ready for reuse again next year.

Our annual beach clean again revealed just how successful these practices have been — very few plastic bags were found on the beach or harbour area for the second consecutive year.





Award Practical Items or Use a Perpetual or Upcycled Trophy

In keeping with our sustainability ethos, our Camile Mullaghmore Regatta prizes include only practical and reusable items as well as our perpetual trophies. Thankfully our sponsors support our sustainability efforts and to this end Camile sponsored our practical prizes again this year.

Year after year we see crew members proudly re-wearing their t-shirts from previous Regatta's. This year we sourced baseball hats from a local business in Sligo town. Winning skippers also received a reuseable hot/cold drink container sourced from Eco Set. Eco Set donate a percentage of each purchase to www.cleancoasts.org.





Publicize Your Sustainability Efforts

Mullaghmore Sailing Club actively promoted our plans to host a Clean Regatta and our environmental initiatives through social media, newsletters, and community events.

Our annual Beach Clean was well-attended again this year and was run in collaboration with Mullaghmore Active. The effort to our village's Tidy Town submission, in which we ranked 7th out of 23 towns/villages in Co. Sligo.

The Sailing Club hosted the Mullaghmore Biodiversity Blitz Day this year as part of National Biodiversity Week which proved to be a massive success. Over 125 species were recorded over a 3-hour period and the attendees enjoyed educational talks on biodiversity.

We made sure to tag @sailorsforthesea in our social media posts as well and really appreciated the encouragement back from them. We again utilised the Sailors for the Sea logos and social media documents. We printed and laminated the Sailors for the Sea posters this year for display around the club. These have been wiped down and stored for use again next year.

Camille Mullaghmore Regatta skippers were kept updated on our sustainability plans and 20 Best Practices through communication on WhatsApp. Again, we utilised Sailors for the Sea posters.








Involve Local Organizations

This year we were delighted to hold our Camile Mullaghmore Regatta Beach Clean in collaboration with Mullaghmore Active, our local community group. We had participants from across the community come together to achieve a common goal - Keep our coastline clean and plastic free. Participants consistently reported back that the beach and sand dunes were much cleaner than previous years, and this was evidenced with the reduction in volume of rubbish we collected. Sligo County Council collected and disposed of the waste.

The Sailing Club proudly hosted the Mullaghmore Biodiversity Blitz Day this year as part of National Biodiversity Week, and the event was an outstanding success. Over the course of just three hours, participants recorded more than 125 species, while also enjoying a series of engaging and informative talks on local biodiversity and conservation.

The Sailing Club also hosted the Mullaghmore Sustainable Energy Community (SEC) information evening this year, which is a voluntary community initiative to educate and inform how to participate in a SEC and/or install PV solar panels in homes or business.

Mullaghmore Tri-Club kindly supplied a bike stand this year for our Camile Mullaghmore Regatta.







Post Educational and Reusable Signage

Our reusable, laminated signage—created with Sailors for the Sea graphics—continues to direct visitors to recycling, compost, and water refill stations. Educational boards around the clubhouse highlight local marine wildlife, encouraging members and guests to engage with and protect our biodiversity.



Serve Local Food or Source Seafood Sustainably

The annual Mullaghmore Sailing Club Regatta Dinner remains as a social occasion for the whole community here in our small village in Co. Sligo. We are lucky to have excellent organic food growers, seafood suppliers and master butchers on our doorstep and are very happy to support them year after year.

The menu this year included beef brisket cooked over 72hrs in a sous vide bath followed by a charring on our club BBQ, or a slow cooked vegan bean stew. All served along with a selection of salads. Volunteers from our club prepared and cooked both dishes, using equipment that the club invested in over the past few years. This equipment includes a slow cooker, a sous vide bath and a gas BBQ. Our research showed that gas BBQs are the best environmental option versus charcoal. Gas grills are more efficient, burning cleaner with fewer carbon emissions, and better air quality for our grill masters and our neighbours.

Our brisket was sourced from our local butcher Burn's Meats, whose staff continue to implement the Five Freedoms of Animal Welfare: 1. Free from hunger and thirst, 2. Free from discomfort, 3. Free from pain, injury or disease, 4. Free to express natural behaviour, 5. Free from fear and distress. Our salads were sourced again this year from our local café in Grange Co. Sligo, The Jam Pot.







Organize a Green Team

Our enthusiastic Green Team this year included junior instructors, social organisers, and club volunteers, many of whom carried the torch from 2024.

The Green Team worked collaboratively across all aspects of the Regatta — from waste management to food sourcing — ensuring that every detail aligned with Clean Regatta principles.





Ensure Proper Waste Bin Placement and Signage

Clearly labelled stations for Recycling, Compost, Waste, and Glass were strategically placed around the site. Regular monitoring by the Green Team confirmed excellent compliance, with waste correctly separated and glass diverted to local recycling banks.

We also eliminated the use of bags in the general/recycling waste bins this year. We instead opted to wash and disinfect the bins after use, and they are stored for use next year.

In addition, we set up separate glass bins to ensure glass did not end up in landfill. Green Team members took responsibility to dispose of glass into our local recycling banks.





Divert Food Waste from the Landfill

Through careful planning, the Regatta achieved zero food waste again in 2025.

Dinner attendance was managed through online ticketing, allowing accurate meal preparation. Surplus food was reused at the Prizegiving ceremony or distributed among members. All plate scrapings were composted, and even meat scraps were taken home by pet owners, ensuring that nothing went to landfill.



Use Paperless Event Management

All event administration — from boat registration to dinner ticketing and communication — was conducted online through Clubforce, WhatsApp and HalSail as well as through social media posting.

This system eliminated paper waste, improved efficiency, and allowed real-time updates and race results accessible to all participants.

- Clubforce is an online club management platform which streamlines club organisation and removes almost all paperwork. Examples of online transactions which removed the need for paper during the 2025 Regatta are:
 - Registration of boats and skippers taking part in the Regatta
 - Regatta Dinner tickets only available to purchase through Clubforce
 - Email communication/ Updates or changes to schedules sent via Clubforce.
- HalSail is online software that allows us to create, manage and run the Regatta.
 - Results can be entered on any device, and they can be seen online immediately.
 - Records times automatically on phone as boat crosses line.

Host a Beach or Marina Cleanup

Mullaghmore Sailing Club hosted a beach and harbour clean on July 23rd 2025. We collaborated Mullaghmore Active and we had people from across the Mullaghmore community participate in the clean-up. We even had holiday makers join us for the evening. Sligo County Council provided litter grabbers and organised rubbish removal the following day.

Our volunteers combed the beach, sand dunes, riverbank, harbour piers and the green areas around the club. Fishing nets, lines, small plastic fragments, cigarette butts again dominated the collection, but somewhat encouraging were reports back that litter had significantly reduced compared to previous years.









Prevent Toxins from Entering the Water

Spill kits were available on all powerboats, and our Race Officer ensured proper environmental safety briefings were held. Boats are never cleaned near the waterline, preventing harmful runoff into the bay.

The Green Boating Guide was shared electronically with all members before the event.



Increase Awareness of Wildlife and Habitat Protection

Awareness of marine life remains integral to our education programme. Inspired by last year's visit from humpback whale HBIRL24, and return visits this year of humpbacks, fin whales and minke whales our members remain passionate about habitat protection. The bay also welcomed an Orca this year, Aquarius. Aquarius is one of the last two surviving members of the Scottish West Coast Community of killer whales, the other being John Coe. His presence in the bay has been considered a "magical wildlife encounter". Our club members continue to serve alongside the Irish Whale and Dolphin organisation and recently refloated a live stranded dolphin. Well done to all involved.

The Sailing Club hosted the Mullaghmore Biodiversity Blitz Day this year as part of National Biodiversity Week, and the event was an outstanding success. Offer Vegetarian or Vegan Alternatives

In line with sustainable catering practices, our Regatta Dinner featured vegetarian and vegan dishes, including the much-loved vegan bean stew and a variety of fresh local salads prepared by The Jam Pot Café.





Promote Alternative Transportation

This year we welcomed two visiting boats from Sligo Yacht Club to compete in the Camile Mullaghmore Regatta. The two visiting J24s from Sligo Yacht Club once again sailed to Mullaghmore instead of being trailered by road — a testament to sustainable travel in action.

As most members of the club live locally there is little need for car transportation. Most of our instructors and volunteers walk or cycle to the club. Mullaghmore Tri – Club kindly supplied a bike stand this year. We promoted the use of our Local Link bus service, circulating timetables to skippers. The bus stop is conveniently located beside the club entrance.





Reduce Day-of Event Emissions

At Mullaghmore Sailing Club our aim is to limit the environmental impact of our annual Regatta. All participating boats in the Regatta are sailing yachts, allowing us to operate entirely under wind power as we sail on and off our moorings without the need for engines. A strict speed restriction is enforced within the harbour and mooring area to further reduce fuel use and emissions.

The committee boat anchors and powers down its engine for the duration of racing once the course is set. Motorboat use is kept to an absolute minimum, limited only to the essential marklaying and safety RIBs.

Registration and communication for the Regatta all happens online, removing paper transactions.



Inspire Future Action

The Green Boating Guide was circulated to all Skippers prior to our Camile Mullaghmore Regatta 2025. We posted on our social media account as well as directly sending out the principles on the WhatsApp group. Our sailors consistently demonstrate environmentally responsible habits — from reusable sailing gear and waterproof bags to reusing and repairing older equipment.

We hope that by the Sailing Club hosting two events this year; The Mullaghmore Biodiversity Blitz Day and the Mullaghmore Sustainable Energy Community (SEC) information evening, we will inspire club members and the wider Mullaghmore community to take tangible action towards running Green Events and respecting our amazing environment and wildlife we have in our bay.



Conclusion

The Camile Mullaghmore Regatta 2025 has once again exemplified the principles of the Sailors for the Sea Clean Regatta Programme, and we believe successfully implemented all 20 Best Practices at Platinum Level.
